ROAD MAP STATUS REPORT: PHASE I

FACT SHEET:

The Road Map is a document intended to provide a framework to end Israel's military occupation of Palestinian Territory and establish a viable, independent Palestinian state. The Road Map, which is divided into three phases, sets out obligations for both Israel and the Palestinians. Obligations within each phase are to be carried out in parallel (unless expressly specified otherwise).

Set forth below is a status report of each party's Phase I obligations. Since the obligations are to be carried out in parallel, the obligations set forth below are in no particular order.

PALESTINIAN OBLIGATIONS:

 PA Prime Minister, Mahmoud Abbas, issued the following statement to the Israeli government and the Israeli public:

"We want a lasting peace with you achieved through negotiations."

"We denounce terrorism by any party and in all its shapes and forms both because of our religious and moral traditions and because we are convinced that such methods do not lend support to a just cause like ours, but rather destroy it."

"I repeat, there is no military solution to this conflict." (29 April 2002)

- Palestine National Council accepted UN Security Council Resolution 242, expressly calling for "respect for and acknowledgement of the sovereignty, territorial integrity and political independence of every State in the area..." (15 November 1988)
- Letter signed by President Arafat to Israel's Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin stated:

"The PLO recognizes the right of the State of Israel to exist in peace and security." (9 September 1993)

- Palestinian Charter formally amended by Palestine National Council to reflect September 1993 letter. (24 April 1996)
- Charter amendment reaffirmed by Palestine Central Council in Gaza meeting addressed by then-US President Clinton. (14 December 1998)

ISRAELI OBLIGATIONS:

Israel has not accepted the Road Map, having previously submitted more than 100 objections and proposed changes. Israel's Prime Minister, Ariel Sharon, recently stated, "Oh, the Quartet is nothing! Don't take it seriously." (*Newsweek*, 18 January 2003).

"GOI [Government of Israel] takes no actions undermining trust, including deportations, attacks on civilians, confiscation and/or demolition of Palestinian homes and property, as a punitive measure or to facilitate Israeli construction; destruction of Palestinian institutions and infrastructure and other measures specified in the Tenet Work Plan."

Since 20 December 2002, the original date of the Road Map:

- Israel destroyed the Ministry of Culture building in Tulkarm on 15 January 2003.
 Israel destroyed many PA buildings, prisons, institutions, historic sites, and the Gaza airport from September 2000 to present.
- Israel has continued construction of the socalled "security" wall deep within Occupied Palestinian Territory threatening *de facto* annexation of approximately 10% of the Occupied West Bank. The construction of the wall has resulted in wide-scale destruction of olive trees, fruit orchards, greenhouses and other sources of Palestinian agricultural revenue.
